1. AUTHORIZING THE CHAIRMAN OF THE LIVINGSTON COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS TO SIGN A COOPERATIVE USE AGREEMENT WITH CORNELL COOPERATIVE EXTENSION LIVINGSTON COUNTY FOR USE, TRANSPORT, AND STORAGE OF PUBLIC EDUCATION EQUIPMENT

WHEREAS, the County entered into a contract with the Oswego County Soil & Water Conservation District on behalf of the Finger Lakes-Lake Ontario Watershed Protection Alliance to fund implementation and public education projects in the Conesus Lake watershed; and

WHEREAS, the County's contract work plan supports public education on sediment and erosion control; and

WHEREAS, the County purchased a rainfall simulator, which demonstrates how different ground surfaces affect erosion and sedimentation, for \$4,917.73; and

WHEREAS, the County intends the rainfall simulator to be at public education events and wants to partner with an organization that has experience in public education and outreach to store, transport, and use this equipment; and

WHEREAS, Cornell Cooperative Extension Livingston County has a proven history of conducting educational programming for youth and the general public at festivals, fairs, classes and events both indoors and outdoors; and

WHEREAS, Cornell Cooperative Extension Livingston County has the expertise and capacity to use, transport, and store the rainfall simulator for public education events; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Chairman of the Livingston County Board of Supervisors is hereby authorized to sign a Cooperative Use Agreement with Cornell Cooperative Extension Livingston County, according to the term designated, subject to review by the County Attorney and County Administrator.

Ms. Crowe reviewed the simulator agreement.

2. RESOLUTION PURSUANT TO THE STATE ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY REVIEW ACT CONCERNING THE DETERMINATION OF SIGNIFICANCE FOR THE APPROVAL OF FUNDING AGREEMENTS FOR WATER INFRASTRUCTURE IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS: TOWN OF YORK, TOWN OF LEICESTER & VILLAGE OF GENESEO

WHEREAS, on December 23, 2014, an Order on Consent and Administrative Settlement (the "Order") was entered into by and among the State of New York, the County, and Akzo Nobel Inc. and Akzo Nobel Salt Inc. (collectively, "Akzo Nobel"), for purposes of addressing future impacts resulting from the Retsof Salt Mine collapse that occurred on March 12, 1994. The Order required Akzo Nobel to pay \$20,000,000.00 (the "Akzo Nobel Settlement Funds") jointly to New York State and the County, with the understanding the funds would be used to mitigate impacts of the mine collapse; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution 2020-219, the Livingston County Board of Supervisors (the "Board") authorized the County Administrator to form a committee, now known as the "Akzo Settlement Committee,"

for purposes of developing policies and procedures and providing recommendations on projects to be funded through the use of the Akzo Nobel Settlement Funds; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution 2024-446, the Board formally approved the Akzo Settlement Committee's recommendation to enter into a funding agreement with the Town of York for water infrastructure improvements to be made within the jurisdictional limits of the Town, specifically the installation of a water main along Craig Road, River Road and York Road and the replacement of the pump station on Flats Road. The Town will independently manage and control administering this project; and

WHEREAS, by Resolution 2025-449, the Board formally approved the Akzo Settlement Committee's recommendation to enter into a funding agreement with the Village of Geneseo for water infrastructure improvements to be made within the jurisdictional limits of the Village of Geneseo, specifically: (1) Installation of a total trihalomethanes ("TTHM") removal system in the Village's three (3) MGD water storage tank; (2) Installation of a permanent backup generator and additional spare pumps at the Village's Water Treatment Plant; and (3) completion of piping changes and upsizing to the Village's interconnection with the Livingston County Water and Sewer Authority ("WSA") at the Village's Water Treatment Plant. The Village will independently manage and control administering this project; and

WHEREAS, the Board now desires to authorize a funding agreement with the Town of Leicester (the "Funding Agreement" and together with other past or future agreements for water infrastructure improvement projects related to impacts from the Retsof Salt Mine collapse, the "Funding Agreements"), specifically: (1) Installation of a new water storage tank to replace an existing water storage tank along with a total trihalomethanes ("TTHM") removal system and installation of additional exterior piping for connection of a mobile pump station; and (2) Installation of the Perry Road Water District involving roughly 18,000 linear feet of 12-inch water main along Perry Road, west of River Road ("Funding Agreement Project"). The Town will independently manage and control administering this project; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Article 8 of the New York Environmental Conservation Law, as amended (the "SEQR Act") and the regulations adopted pursuant the DEC, being 6 NYCRR Part 617, et. seq., as amended (the "Regulations" and collectively with the SEQR Act, "SEQRA"), the Board must satisfy the requirements contained in SEQRA prior to making a final determination whether to undertake these Funding Agreements; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to SEQRA, the Board is normally required to review an entire set of activities or steps in a single environmental review but, if a lead agency believes that circumstances warrant a segmented review, it must clearly state in its determination of significance the supporting reasons and must demonstrate that such review is clearly no less protective of the environment; and

WHEREAS, the Board believes that a segmented review of the Funding Agreements, together with any future funding agreements, is warranted under the circumstances and is no less protective of the environment; and

WHEREAS, the Board's thorough review and analysis of Part 1 of a Full Environmental Assessment Form, dated December 23, 2025 ("EAF"), the NYSDEC's Environmental Resource Mapper ("NYSDEC Mapper"), the New York State Cultural Resource Information System ("CRIS"), and other relevant environmental information (collectively, the "Environmental Information") and potential environmental impacts associated with the Funding Agreements reveals the Funding Agreements will not have any potentially significant adverse environmental impacts; and

WHEREAS, it is appropriate that the Board issue a negative declaration pursuant to SEQRA for the Funding Agreements; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Livingston County Board of Supervisors hereby makes the following findings: (1) Based upon a thorough review and examination of the Funding Agreements and the Environmental Information, and upon the Board's knowledge of the area surrounding the land and such further investigation of the Funding Agreements and their environmental effects as the Board has deemed appropriate, the Board determines with respect to the Funding Agreements:

- (a) The approval of the Funding Agreements is an Unlisted Action pursuant to SEQR as the Funding Agreements involve the disturbance of no land and does not meet or exceed

any threshold for a Type I Action;

(b) The Board has undertaken an uncoordinated review of the Funding Agreements in accordance with the requirements of SEQRA; and

(c) No potentially significant adverse impacts on the environment are noted in the Environmental Information and none are known to the Board.

(2) With respect to the scope of environmental review, the Board determines that segmentation of the environmental review for the Funding Agreements from the environmental review of the projects as a whole is warranted under the circumstances and is no less protective of the environment. The reasons supporting this determination are as follows:

(a) Segmenting the review of the Funding Agreements from the development of the projects is no less protective of the environment. There are no cumulative adverse impacts from the projects which will combine with the Funding Agreements to exacerbate environmental impacts. Moreover, the Board and municipalities will not be permitted to proceed with the projects until completion of a detailed and thorough environmental review specific to the projects is completed under the jurisdiction of the municipality receiving Akzo Settlement Funds. The municipalities have acknowledged and understand that the projects cannot proceed unless/until a SEQRA process has been completed for each and every project.

(b) The Board acknowledges segmentation is disfavored under SEQRA. Nonetheless, the Board believes it is reasonable to consider segmentation of actions and segmentation findings can reasonably be made on a case-by-case basis in a manner that is no less protective of the environment. It is important to note that a segmented review of the Funding Agreements will not create either of the two dangers that SEQRA seeks to avoid.

(i) The first danger of segmentation is that the action under review is practically determinative of other future projects. In this case, the Funding Agreements involve agreements with local municipalities to receive funding to create detailed engineering plans but does not commit the parties to construction of the projects without compliance with SEQRA. Approving the Funding Agreements is not determinative of any development, and does not commit any local municipality to undertaking any specific development.

(ii) The second danger of segmentation is that the Funding Agreements will be split from an overall larger project so as to avoid environmental review. The Board has completed the EAF for the Funding Agreements in order to thoroughly analyze the potential adverse environmental impacts associated with the Funding Agreements. The EAF comprehensively reviews each potential environmental impact associated with the Funding Agreements. Thus, the Funding Agreements have not escaped any environmental review. Similarly, any development of the projects will undergo a detailed review pursuant to SEQRA. Further, no potential development plans have been proposed and no specific future use is known for the projects. Any evaluation of the potential impacts of any future development would be impossible and purely speculative at this time. For this reason, a segmented environmental review between the Funding Agreements and any future development of the projects is warranted under the circumstances.

(3) Based upon the Board's review of the Environmental Information and investigations of the potential environmental impacts associated with the Funding Agreements, considering both the magnitude and importance of each potential environmental impact indicated, and upon the Board's knowledge of the land and surrounding area and such further investigations of the Funding Agreements and its environmental effects as the Board has deemed appropriate, the Board has determined the Funding Agreements will not have a significant adverse impact upon the environment.

(4) Since the Funding Agreements will not have a significant adverse impact on the environment, a negative declaration ("Negative Declaration") pursuant to SEQRA is hereby issued. This Negative Declaration has been prepared pursuant to and in accordance with the requirements of SEQRA.

(5) The Board Chairman is authorized on behalf of the Board to distribute copies of this Resolution and to do such further things or perform such acts as may be necessary or convenient to implement the provisions of this Resolution. To the extent this Resolution covers Funding Agreements that have already been approved by the Board, the Board ratifies the approval of such Funding Agreements (including amendments thereto) in reliance on this Negative Declaration.

Ms. Crowe explained that this indicates that we should also do SEQR even though the towns will be the lead agency.

Land Bank

The rehabilitation work at 36 South Street has begun and the Land Bank has purchased 18 Mill Street in Nunda for rehabilitation.

Mobile Home Replacement Program

Livingston County has received an award letter for its application to the Mobile and Manufactured Home Replacement Grant Program for \$500,000.00. Program work will begin in quarter one of 2026 in partnership with the County Land Bank.

Supportive Housing Study

The Planning staff and Angela Ellis of *Community Intelligent Planning* are continuing to meet with partners for the supportive housing study. DSS will be extending this contract engagement into 2026 to continue the work.

Vacant Rental Improvement Program

Livingston County has begun working with the State to kick off the VRP and finalize the grant agreement. The Land Bank will be working on the project in coordination with the County as a Sub-Recipient.

LIGHT UP LIVINGSTON BROADBAND PROGRAM

Municipal Infrastructure Program (MIP)

- Permitting and Make-Ready activities continue with coordination between vendors, the utility companies, NYSDOT and the ConnectALL office (CAO). The Project Management Team (PMT) meetings have moved to bi-weekly as construction progresses with regular updates and coordination with Hunt Engineers and other sub-contractors.
- Labor for fiber deployment is progressing with 21 miles of fiber hung and increasing daily with two contractors working through the end of the year. Eternal Technologies projects 38.6 miles and DDS Companies project 13.2 miles will be hung before the end of 2025.
- Multiple Service Terminals (MST) are activated along the ReConnect backbone which would allow for splicing on routes in Service Area 1 and 2 on both the MIP and ReConnect projects.
- *ConnectALL Office:*
 - a. The first project milestone payment of \$2,869,454.67 was received on December 10 (124 days processing by CAO).
 - b. The CAO requires all grant recipients meet weekly and the project leaders also attend this weekly meeting, among others as required by the State.
 - c. Milestone two is anticipated to close out December 31, 2025 with a filing early February following an audit by Bonadio. Expenditures to date (December 19) under this milestone are \$3,751,666.52 with expected close out \$5,419,999.30.
- Materials have been arriving in the Conesus storage site, anticipating deliveries continue through the new year with all items ordered on site by mid-January.
- *Marketing and Public Relations:* The subcommittee meets bi-weekly to discuss customer sign ups and increasing the take rate. www.LightUpLivingston.com is regularly updated public information. Residents can query their location for service information.

USDA ReConnect Awarded ReConnect Project (Partnership with Empire Access):

- It is anticipated Empire Access will reach substantial completion for their ReConnect deployment in Q1 2026 which would begin their payback under this partnership. Staff continues to coordinate with representatives at Empire regarding the amount of customers connected in their network for this payment.

TRANSPORTATION

Nunda Active Transportation Plan

The Request for Proposals (RFP) was released on November 21, 2025. Town and Village officials will review the proposals from interested consultants in January.

Safe Streets and Roads for All Grant

GTC staff continue to work with the regional project managers at TY Lin for project data collection.

Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) Grant Applications

Planning Staff is working with the Village of Geneseo, Village of Mount Morris, Town of Livonia, and Town of York to determine interest in and coordinate applications to the NYS TAP Grant.

Livingston County Mobility Management

- On October 9, 2025 NYSDOT awarded Livingston County the next cycle of funding for Mobility Management (\$490,000.00), awaiting the grant contract from the State. The amendment to accept the funding is in process.
- Medical Motor Service has been the County’s mobility manager since October 1, a meeting with Department Leaders utilizing this service is scheduled in January for feedback and alignment with existing operations.

WATER INFRASTRUCTURE

Akzo Nobel Settlement Committee: The Akzo Settlement Committee will meet after Public Services Committee on January 6, 2026. The NYSDEC has given written consent to the projects submitted on the FY 25-26 budget submitted by the County to the partners. Sub-recipient agreements are on January 6 Public Services Committee for contract creation for the Town of Leicester and amendment for The Town of York. The Village of Geneseo sub-recipient agreement is in the contracting process. Payments to date have been made to Town of York for project related expenses.

Mt. Morris Campus Water Study: The consultant presented a revised report with alternatives to the Committee on December 15, 2025. After continued conversation and additional thoughts from the Committee the consultant will present a revised report at their next Committee meeting on January 12, 2026. A contract amendment for this engagement is anticipated with C&S Engineers to increase both price and term in February.
